OUR MAIN PRIORITIES

To develop the curriculum to ensure it is context specific, promotes a love of reading, develops high standards of writing in all subjects.

To develop a greater understanding of data and its impact on improving teaching and learning.

To review the behaviour policy and procedures to ensure it is effective for addressing all behaviour across the school.

To develop the different levels of leadership across the school.

IPADS 1:1

We are in a privileged position at Belgrave to be able to offer our children 1:1 use of the iPads in lesson time. Working closely with Apple Specialists we have started to use the iPads to increase engagement in lessons and have a positive impact on learning.

We aim to create a safe and supportive environment, where all can feel empowered to independently develop their own skills and knowledge, taking risks where necessary in order to raise aspirations. Since September the children have been using the iPads to complete creative activities and receive personalised feedback on their work. Staff now have the power to give verbal feedback on work. The children have been using the iPads to capture their learning journey and upload their work onto Showbie.

COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT

The Avenue is an Early Years Special Needs Unit which offers places to children from the age of 3 up to 5 years (the Foundation Stage). We are part of Belgrave St. Bartholomew's Academy but have our own site and staff, with our building located a 5 minute walk from the main school.

All of our amazing children are unique and have a wide variety of individual needs. We use a highly personalised approach to learning, beginning by linking our children with a key person who has the skills and specialist training to meet their individual needs.

Children who attend the resource make good progress in language and communication due to the intensive Specialist Support, whether through the use of Makaton, PECS or spoken language.

OUR MAIN PRIORITIES

Developing reading and phonics across school so that all children can strive to become fluent, expressive readers.

Ensuring high quality texts and language rich reading opportunities are integrated across the curriculum.

Ensuring that barriers to learning are effectively identified and reduced by ensuring teaching is adapted to meet the needs of all pupils, especially those from disadvantaged backgrounds.

Ensuring all learning uses Quality First Teaching so that our curriculum is rich, broad, progressive and engaging, building on prior learning and experiences.

AWARDS AND ACHIEVEMENTS

It has been an exciting few months at Cranberry as we have gained two prestigious awards for our curriculum!

Firstly, over the summer, we found out that we had been awarded a gold standard for the nationally recognised PE Quality Mark. This is in recognition of all the exciting opportunities that our staff provide in PE for our pupils both as part of a wide, diverse PE curriculum and extra-curricular opportunities.

We have also recently been awarded a Platinum Award from the Woodland Trust for all of our Outdoor Learning work. We have developed our outdoor learning environment and curriculum to ensure that all children have the opportunity to experience rich learning opportunities outside in our extensive woodland and garden area.

In May, we were assessed by NAACE on the quality of computing and technology that we provide for the children of our school. Again, we were extremely proud to be awarded the Kite Mark. The assessor was impressed with how we incorporate computing and technology within all areas of the curriculum and was able to see evidence of this on his tour, as well as evidence gathered from interviewing staff and children about the use of computing in our school.

Our new KS2 building was also completed during the summer term 2019-20. We now have eight, lovely, spacious new classrooms and a brand new library to enjoy. We had a grand opening and invited a number of members of the local community to come and enjoy our new space.

Hazel Slade Academy joined St. Bart's Multi Academy trust in June 2018 and is situated in Cannock with extensive grounds that include Cannock Chase to which our children have access to through the Forest Schools opportunities.

We are a small primary school consisting of 170 pupils from Nursery to Year 6 and the Academy has strong links with local high schools including Kingsmead and Norton Canes High.

We have recently secured grant funding from the National Lottery to support the wider community engagement opportunities and to work with external organisations to support children and families.

During 2019, following the conversion from a LA school to a member of the St. Bart's Multi Academy Trust we have benefited from an extensive buildings programme of improvements.

COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT

As part of our outreach from The Lighthouse Centre on our site, workshops for parents are held weekly and are well attended. Our work has been recognised as exemplary by the Lichfield Diocese and we are regularly used as an example of school and church working together for the benefit of the community which has a direct impact of the personal development of our children.

Our choir regularly perform to audiences across the wider community and city of Stoke on Trent. This year they were asked to sing in Lichfield Cathedral as part of the National Children's Society 50th Year celebration.

The school has excellent links with the local church, St., Mary's, and wider community. Rev. Dave Street regularly leads worship alongside Rev. Malcolm Mycock. The whole school attends St., Mary's each year for Harvest, Christmas, Easter and our Leavers Service. The school is also invited to contribute to the Harvest, Remembrance Service, Christingle and Christmas Carol Service held at the church.

The school supports a number of charities locally and nationally through contributions to Foodbank, Douglas McMillan and Children in Need and internationally by contributing to Compassion UK and sponsoring two children in differing locations enabling our children to understand how they can make a difference to others less fortunate than themselves.

AN APPLE A DAY

Kingsland CE Academy has continued to push forward as a leader in using technology to enrich school life and provide opportunities for children to learn in new and innovative ways.

As of September 2019, every child in KS1 & KS2 have their own iPad to complete work on in school and every child has been given the opportunity to take the iPad home.

We are the first school collaborating with Pearson Publishing to adapt and use some of their work schemes such as Power Maths and Bug Club on iPad.

Our school continues to be the Apple Regional Training Centre for the whole of Stoke-on-Trent where we hold events and deliver iPad training to schools to St. Bart's Multi Academy Trust and further afield.



SHINING BRIGHT IN OUR COMMUNITY



The Lighthouse Centre has now been open for just over a year and has been important in supporting our parents and families both in and outside term-time. Our Holiday Clubs over the Summer Holidays have been very well recieved.

The Lantern Cafe has been a vital part of the success of the Lighthouse Centre and has provided opportunities to make new friends, overcome challenges and gain new skills whilst enjoying a cake, panini or cappuccino!

Meeting rooms in the Lighthouse Centre have been used by local businesses, St. Bart's Multi Academy Trust, our local Church and the NHS as meeting spaces throughout the past year. We hope to continue working together with our local community.

Our focus last year was to focus on exploiting all available learning spaces at school:

£54000 of school resources was invested in improving our outdoor learning space. The children now have access to a mugger with full astro football pitch, a daily mile track, a sensory corridor, Hobbit House and Stage. We have a studio space for our music and creative arts, a sensory room, a woodland room for our spiritual learning and Knutton kitchen. We are currently revamping our IT room to create our Discovery Room.

At the end of the year we invested in 70 new ipads to add to the current 30. Staff and children are developing their skills in using these to enrich their learning.

In 2017-2018 we had a new roof and in 2018-19 overhauled the heating system, allowing us to be more energy efficient.

COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT

In 2018 we were approached by the Council to take over the running of the library. We agreed and now are working hard to establish the library at the heart of the community.

The school has excellent links with the local church, St. Mary's, and Elim Church Silverdale. Rev. Jonathan Watkins and members of Elim Church regularly lead worship. The whole school attends St. Mary's each year for Harvest, Christmas and Easter.

Our active choirs: Songbirds and Boyz Noyz are going from strength to strength – their biggest achievement last year was entertaining the guests at Staffordshire's Dignity awards.

As part of our new curriculum approach, we plan a 'Legacy Learning' opportunity for every year group. This gives every child the opportunity to serve their school or wider local, national or international community. Legacy Learning helps our children develop their understanding of British Values, and our own school values, and nurtures children's development as responsible, respectful and compassionate global citizens. Our learning includes: growing vegetables, planting flowers in our local community, Operation Christmas Child - packing shoeboxes with small gifts for children who are in need, both in the UK and internationally, Macmillan coffee afternoon - raising money to help Douglas Macmillan support families affected by cancer, Harvest Festival - collecting for our local food bank to support local families, Open Door project with St. Mary's Church, Police Cadets, developing relationships with the residents of Mill Rise, World War 2 tea room for family and friends and leading the act of Remembrance at Knutton war memorial.

The school supports a number of charities locally and nationally through contributions to The Alice Charity, Macmillan, Comic Relief and Children in Need.

As a school, we collect crisp packets, printer cartridges and batteries to recycle. Residents within the community are bringing in these items and using our school as a hub to recycle.



It was also lovely to celebrate local businesses and to discuss the pottery industry and this also enabled us to use the knowledge of one of our parents. Educational visits have also been planned to local museums.

Within the Federation we are developing our community links. Last week Year 3 performed a wonderful Harvest assembly where they sang, read and shared their work to remind us all about how much we have to celebrate. It was lovely to see so many friends and relatives of the Year 3 children come and join in with our celebrations. In our mixed Year 1/2 class the children also delivered a Harvest assembly for parents. Children from all year groups from both the Infant and Junior sites brought in items of food which have been donated and gratefully received by our local food bank at St. Andrew's Church. This will help to support the families in our local area. We are also looking forward to visiting St. Andrew's to participate in a Christmas service.

We believe that establishing links with our local High schools is vitally important for our children. Children from Year 5 visited Moorside High School on the 15th October to learn all about Gases during a science day. They carried out a number of scientific experiments involving acids and other chemicals to create gas. They learned to use scientific equipment such as Bunsen burners, test tubes and conical flasks to investigate what happens when different elements are put together. It was also a great opportunity to get an early insight into High School lessons and to develop the confidence of our children.
